

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FOLLOWING THE SILK ROAD

A ROADMAP OF MORE THAN 30.000 KM AND CROSSING 17 COUNTRIES

Historical trade route between the Eastern and Western civilizations – crossing oasis and mountains –, the Silk Road guides my itinerary. Kilometers after kilometers, I am meeting populations across more than 17 countries. My goal is to learn from as many cultures and traditions as possible, for they are both so much rooted with the know-how of the builders around the world. From France to China, I am exploring with my 3-wheeler the sumptuous landscapes and cities that our ancestors took centuries ago to build a multicultural world.



WHAT IS A THREE WHEELER ?

I am driving a 3-wheeler Piaggio APE AD1, manufactured in 1965 in Italy and totally restored in 2015 for this project. Mainly used in the sixties by craftworkers and builders, who enjoyed its ability to carry heavy equipments with the trailer on the backside and to be driven in narrow streets, I wanted to turn this urban vehicule into an expedition one. Today the 3-wheelers remain famous in South Asian countries such as Thailand or India where Tuktuks, rickshaw and tempo are still running.
